

The Adventures of Rohver Activity Book For Kids .

Play Nice.

Our individual behavior reflects on the entire OHV community. Please be courteous to others and use common sense while on the trail.

Be Friendly.

Say hello, to all users. Help create a more favorable impression of OHV enthusiasts on and off the trails

Be Respectful.

All recreational users have the same privilege to enjoy multi-use trails. Please respect that ability.


Be Aware.

On the trail, slow down around other users and in areas where visibility is limited, especially on crowded days.

Pack it Out.

Everyone appreciates a clean trail. Try to leave the area cleaner than you found it by taking a second to stop and pick up trash.

If you're under 16, always ride with an adult.





- Always wear appropriate safety gear including helmets, eye protection, pants, long sleeve shirts, gloves, and over-the-ankle boots.
- Be prepared for your ride with the basics: bring extra water, have proper tools and fill your fuel tank.











Start at the top and find your way out of this trail system while being a responsible OHVer.

Always stay on the main trail, even when crossing streams.


Don't take any shortcuts and avoid wildlife on the trail.

And remember to yield to any oncoming traffic.





- Keep right, ride in control and slow down when approaching other trail users. Give them room without leaving the trail.
- Off-Highway Vehicles (OHVs) should yield the right of way to non-motorized trail users.
- Let faster OHVs pass by slowing and moving to the right on a wide trail or pulling over in a safe turnout.





- Avoid spinning your wheels when accelerating and sliding your wheels when braking. Both gouge the trail and create ruts.
- Practice using only enough power to clear an obstacle or climb a hill. Wheel spin steals your momentum.





- Save riding for the trails. Don't ride around unnecessarily in campsites and at trailheads. Your fellow campers will thank you.
- Don't create "play tracks" inside of camping areas or along established trails. Ride the main route and stay within designated riding areas.



Parents need to be prepared for the trail also.

Here is some additional information to consider before heading out on your OHV.

Know Where To Go.

- Is the trail open to and a designated route for your vehicle?
- Use official agency maps and observe all signs.
- Motor vehicle use maps are available at staythetrail.org/maps

Do Your Homework.

- What types of challenges can be found on the route: rock, sand, stream crossings, ledges?
- Know your group's skill level and keep track of younger kids on winding trails.
- Will you be above tree line? Remember to stay off the tundra!

Are You and Your Vehicle Prepared?

- Know your vehicle. Keep it in good condition and read the owners manual.
- Forest Service approved spark arrestors are required on all OHVs operated on public lands.
- Pipe down! Obey the sound limits. To operate a off-highway vehicle in Colorado, the following sound limits must be met:
 - 96dB(A) if manufactured after 1/1/1998
 - 99dB(A) if manufactured before 1/1/1998
- All vehicles (licensed or not) operated on routes designated open to off-highway vehicles are required to obtain and display a Colorado OHV Registration or a Colorado OHV Permit, for questions contact Colorado Parks & Wildlife.
- Let someone know where you're going and when you expect to return.


Puzzie Answers
