

GENERAL PARK RULES

- All motor vehicles must display a valid park pass, even street licensed OHV's.
- Motor vehicles are permitted on authorized roads only.
- Camping and parking are permitted only in designated areas.
- Fires are permitted in designated grills and fire pits only.
- Use proper receptacles for trash, wastewater and sewage.
- Pets must be kept on a six-foot or shorter leash and controlled at all times.
- Damaging live or dead standing trees is prohibited.
- Other laws and regulations apply. If you have any questions, please ask park staff or pick up a complete list of park rules at the Visitor Center.
- OHV use in designated campgrounds is limited to entering and exiting the campsite.

OUT-OF-STATE OHV's

- Out-of-state residents who bring OHV's into Colorado must have OHV registration from their home state. If your state does not have an OHV registration program, you must purchase a Colorado non-resident OHV permit.
- OHV's registered in their home state are required to purchase a Colorado non-resident OHV permit if they will be in Colorado for over 30 days.

REGISTRATION

- The current registration fee is \$15.25
- Registrations are valid from April 1 - March 31
- Decals must be permanently attached.
- Registration card must be available for inspection
- Registration can be purchased at any State Park.

OHV REGULATIONS

IT IS UNLAWFUL TO:

- Possess an OHV without valid registration.
- Operate an OHV in a careless or reckless manner.
- Operate an OHV while under the influence.
- Operate OHV's by persons under 10 years of age.
- Operate an OHV by persons over 10 years of age unless they are a licensed driver or under the direct supervision of a licensed driver.
- Operate an OHV with passengers in unsafe positions.
- Operate above the posted speed limit.
- Operate without the required lights, muffler, brakes, and spark arrester.
- Operate on non-designated roads and trails.

CONSIDERATIONS

- Use of a helmet, eye protection, and other appropriate safety equipment is highly recommended.
- You are sharing the park with other visitors.
- Please be careful and courteous.
- It is unlawful to enter privately owned property without the permission of the landowner for any purpose.

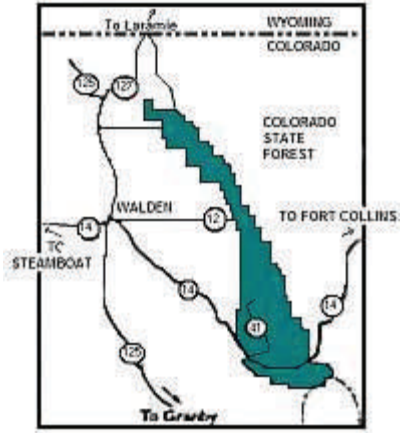

RECOMMENDED RIDES *

Montgomery Pass Road

Length: 4 miles
Level of difficulty: moderate - difficult
Access: Start on Bockman Road just past the south fork of the Michigan River.

This rocky road takes you to the top of Montgomery Pass, where you will have stunning views.

Diamond Peaks Trail / Bockman Road

Length: 4 miles / 6 miles
Level of difficulty: moderate
Access: For Diamond Peaks Trail start on Bockman Road past Montgomery Pass Road it then loops back to Bockman Road.

This rocky trail is only designated as an OHV trail, vehicles are not allowed as it is too narrow.

Bull Mountain / Kiwi / South Canadian Roads

Length: 3.5 miles / 2 miles / 2 miles
Level of difficulty: easy - moderate
Access: Start on County Road 41 near the entrance station building, near the cabins, or past Ruby Jewel.

This road takes you to the top of Bull Mountain, where you will have stunning views. Kiwi Road and South Canadian Road branch off of Bull Mountain.

Ruby Jewel Road / Francisco Road

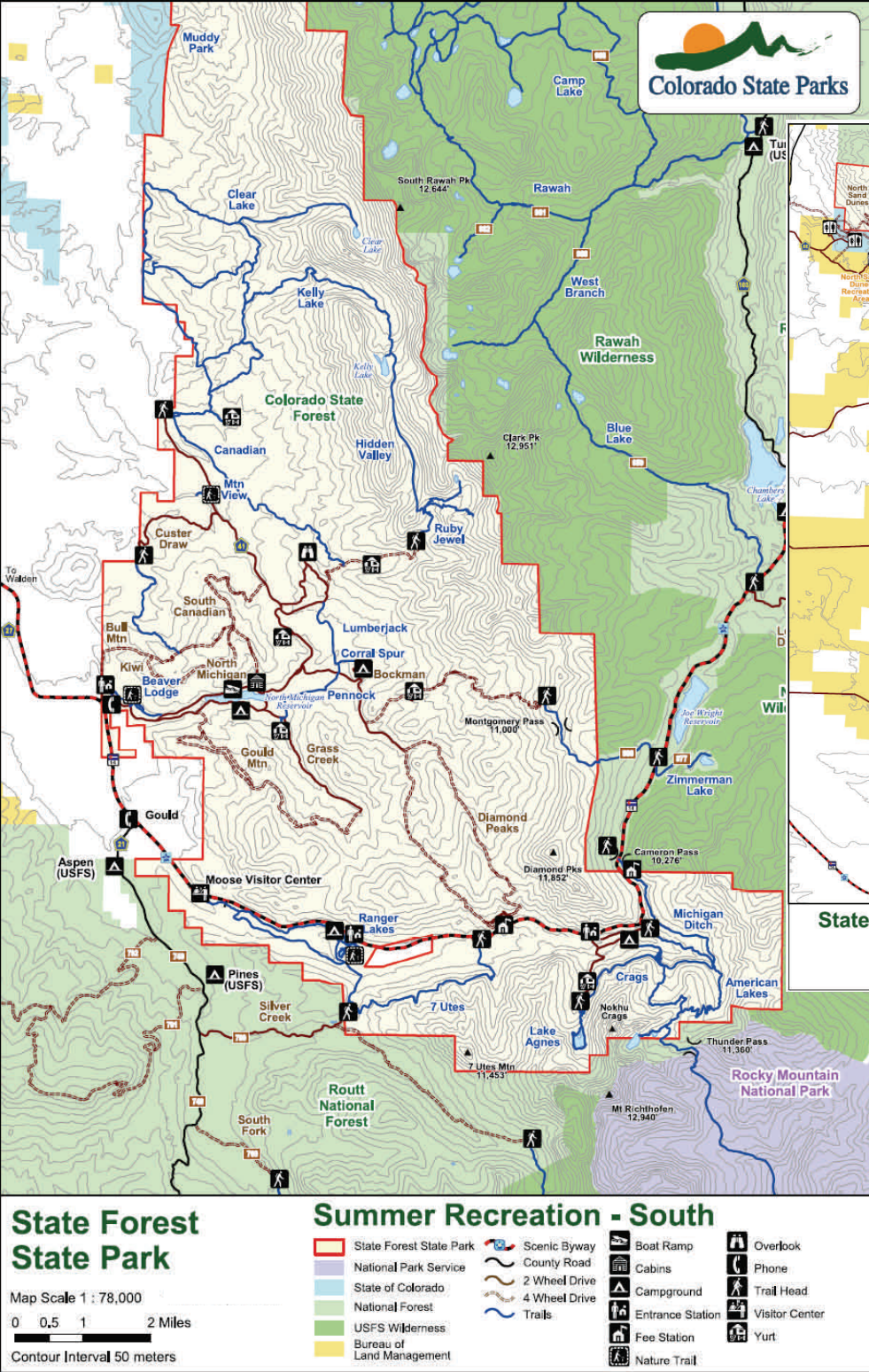
Length: 3.5 miles / 2.5 miles
Level of difficulty: easy - difficult
Access: Start on County Road 41 past Bockman Road.

This road takes you to the non-motorized trail head to Ruby Jewel Lake. Francisco Road branches off of Ruby Jewel and ends at an overlook.

Grass Creek Road / Gould Mountain Road

Length: 8 miles
Level of difficulty: easy - difficult
Access: Start on the south side of North Michigan Reservoir.

Grass Creek is a two wheel drive road that turns into a four wheel drive road going up to the top of Gould Mountain. It makes a loop and connects back to the south side of North Michigan near the Campground.

The North Sand Hills Recreation Area north of Walden is for motorized recreation.

Mendenhall Road / Medicine Bow

Length: 8 miles
Level of difficulty: easy - moderate
Access: Take County Road 8 north of Walden.

This turns into 8A, which intersects Mendenhall Road/Medicine Bow Trail near the ridgeline.

North Sand Hills Recreation Area

Size: 1450 Acres
Level of difficulty: easy - difficult
Access: Take County Road 6E north of Walden and Cowdrey.

The North Sand Hills is on BLM land and its trails and dunes are limited to existing routes. OHV trails leave from the sand hills and enter National and State Forests.

Routt National Forest Trails and Roads

Length: Varies
Level of difficulty: easy - difficult
Access: Start on County Road 21 in the town of Gould, this is also Forest Service Road 740.

This road takes you to many miles of 4x4 trails. Some of the OHV trails and 4x4 roads are Silver Creek, South Fork, Illinois River, Jack Creek, and many more. Forest Service Road 740 takes you over Calamity Pass and through the historic silver mining ghost town of Teller City. Some of the trails lead to Wilderness boundaries, where OHV's are not allowed.

Off - highway recreation vehicles need to be registered with the Colorado Off - Highway Vehicle Program. OHV registration dollars fund trail maintenance, construction, administration, and programs encouraging safe and responsible OHV use.
